

CALL FOR PROPOSALS FOR INDONESIA

Deadline to submit proposals: August 12, 2015

The Global Partnership for Social Accountability (GPSA) supports civil society and governments to work together to solve critical governance challenges in developing countries. To achieve this objective, the GPSA provides strategic and sustained support to CSOs' social accountability initiatives aimed at strengthening transparency and accountability. It builds on the World Bank's direct and ongoing engagement with public sector actors, as well as a network of Global Partner organizations, to create an enabling environment in which citizen feedback is used to solve fundamental problems in service delivery and to strengthen the performance of public institutions. Through a country-tailored approach, GPSA-supported activities are implemented in sectors where the World Bank has a strong involvement and can help governments respond to citizen feedback.

The GPSA works to "close the loop" by supporting citizens to have a more articulated voice, helping governments to listen, and assisting government agencies to act upon the feedback they receive.

The GPSA is pleased to announce its 3rd Global Call for Proposals. The GPSA will support proposals from Indonesian civil society groups to create a space for transparency, innovation and citizen participation, with substantial public accountability elements. The Indonesia GPSA seeks proposals on Social Accountability from Civil Society Organizations to monitor outcomes of centrally funded programs on and/or related to education, health, infrastructure investment, natural resources and extractives, and budget expenditure, as implemented by a cross section of innovative local governments (Province, District, City). Proposals should focus on three dimensions:

- Transparency collaborate with central and local government, citizens and other stakeholders to make public expenditure data transparent to citizens at the local level (fiscal transparency).
- ⇒ Innovation collaborate with technology and/or media partners to track, monitor and/or present complex public expenditure and/or public procurement information in a digestible and easily accessible form to citizens, through innovative use of ICT.
- ➡ Participation collaborate with citizens and innovative local governments to monitor and evaluate service delivery performance vis-a-vis public expenditure at the local level, and to generate data and analysis of performance outcomes.

Following the GPSA's approach, it is expected that the information produced will also be used by other public sector institutions beyond the Executive, including legislative bodies, independent regulatory agencies, and other oversight bodies.

In order to be considered, proposals must demonstrate clearly that:

- 1. The project may expand from pilot to large-scale interventions that may be replicated country-wide;
- 2. The proposed intervention is related to ongoing initiatives focusing on similar objectives. It should identify the value added of GPSA support;
- 3. It proposes clear mentoring and partnership with other CSOs (local and national) and community-based organizations; and
- 4. The project will generate information that is needed to complement existing processes already supported by public institutions.

GPSA supports proposals that:

- Have an estimated duration of 3 to 5 years, in order to enable sustained and strategic funding for Social Accountability;

<u>Eligible CSOs:</u> Legal entities that fall outside the public or for profit sector, such as non-government organizations, not-for-profit media organizations, charitable organizations, faith-based organizations, professional organizations, labor unions, workers' organizations, associations of elected local representatives, foundations and policy development and research institutes.

Applicant CSO must provide proof of legal status in one of GPSA's eligible ("opted-in") countries.
